Mayor Daniel J. Reiman and Superintendent Rosa Diaz have announced that the Carteret School District's \$37 million building referendum has passed, after voters decided in favor of the proposed question by a 3-1 margin (74% - 26%).

"Carteret has voted once again to move our Town into the future with vast improvements to our schools," said Mayor Dan Reiman. "Consistent with projects Borough-wide like our upcoming Performing Arts Center, Ferry Terminal, and beautiful Waterfront, the new Junior High School will increase property values and continue making Carteret a great place to live, work and raise a family."

Mayor Reiman, along with the School Superintendent Rosa Diaz, co-chaired a working group on the school construction project.

"Over the past few years, we've worked together on shared services, cooperative purchasing and recently used shared services to rehabilitate the track and field at Walter J Overholdt Stadium, providing for a new High School field and public park with amenities," continued Mayor Reiman.

or even be proposed without the hard work of Mayor Reiman," said Carteret Board of Education President Marty Murray. "Due to ethics laws, the School Board and School Administration were not permitted to be active proponents of the referendum, but the improvements are clearly needed and overdue, so we thank Mayor Reiman and the Council for their support and help in getting this Referendum passed."

"We've been working very hard to make many improvements to the District and the approved Referendum funds will allow us to continue that progress," said Superintendent Diaz. "Our district's goals are instruction – we believe that all our kids deserve a high-quality education and rigorous curriculum; student health and wellness -we want to provide a culture that's positive and supportive; high quality facilities that are conducive to learning; and security to keep our children and staff safe. The referendum represents the district's best effort to balance the needs of students with that of our taxpayers. Current historically low interest rates, along with the fact that the new Junior High School will be built on existing board property, will result in the lowest possible cost."

30,000 square foot Junior High School featuring state-of theart classrooms and STEM labs, media spaces, a cafeteria, band and music rooms, gym, and think tank, money will also be allocated for new lighting and sound at Carteret High School's Auditorium. In addition, the fire exits and stairwells at the High School will also be made accessible and safer. At Carteret Middle School, the stairwells will be improved and a new heating and air conditioning system will be installed. Nathan Hale Elementary School and Minue School will receive fire exit renovations, with Minue also receiving HVAC renovations.

"Now that the Referendum is approved, qualified bidders will be able to bid on the project in an open process and bids will be awarded. Then construction will start as early as late Summer 2020 and the new building and improvements will be ready approximately three years from September," said project architect Lloyd Rosenberg.

Gary Higgins, CPA for the Board of Education, explained that now is the best time financially for construction of the new Carteret Junior High School.

"We have two things going for us right now that make this the best time to build in the district," said Higgins. "A prior bond issue expired and the current debt service component of the project dropped by approximately \$1.5 million, which freed up

\$790,000 of bond funds annually. In addition, interest rates are at historically low rates. At the current time, we are figuring about 3.5% at current interest rates. A local district just received a 1.9% interest bond. Money is cheap right now, so it's the best time to do construction."

The project is eligible for partial state aid on costs totaling \$12,586,000. On that amount, the district will receive about \$7.4 million, which could only have been ascertained through a referendum and not the yearly budget. Based on current state aid figures, the cost for the average Carteret homeowner will be less than \$7 per month, depending on the amount of aid the state awards Carteret. 51% of the Carteret tax base is collected through residential properties while the remaining 49% is paid by industrial and commercial properties.

Carteret Announces \$700,000 Grant by NJDOT for Extension of Carteret Avenue to Waterfront

Mayor Daniel J. Reiman has been joined by NJ Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin and Middlesex County Freeholder Director Ronald G. Rios to announce that the Borough of Carteret has been awarded a \$700,000 grant from the New Jersey Department of Transportation for the Borough's project to extend Carteret Avenue from its current terminus at Roosevelt Avenue. The roadway extension will connect Carteret Avenue through the Peter J. Sica Industrial Highway to Carteret Waterfront Park.

The estimated total cost of the project is \$1,095,978.75.

"Improving Carteret's roadways is a priority of my administration and we work tirelessly to secure funding for infrastructure projects," said Mayor Reiman. "I want to thank Governor Murphy, Speaker Coughlin, and NJDOT Commissioner Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti for awarding Carteret this grant and past grants as we continue to build a better Carteret."

The improvements to Carteret Avenue will include the widening and extension of the roadway 's alignment from an existing T-intersection with Roosevelt Avenue, extending the roadway approximately 700 linear feet to create a new four-way signalized intersection with Peter J. Sica Industrial Highway. The proposed intersection at the eastern limits of the work on the opposite side of Industrial Highway would also be widened to accommodate


traffic. Additional inlets and drainage pipes will be installed to adequately drain the roadway.

"New Jersey is the most densely populated state in the country which means our roadways are constantly the subject of extreme wear and tear, particularly when industrial traffic is a constant," said Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin. "Grants like the one awarded to Carteret by the New Jersey DOT help ensure that roads in Carteret are safe, well maintained and able to adequately support both car and truck traffic."

This grant is in addition to the \$4 million NJDOT grant the Borough received last fiscal year for improvements to Peter J. Sica Industrial Highway and the \$592,000 NJOT grant the Borough received for streetscape improvements in the upcoming Carteret arts district.

"In Middlesex County, the Board of Chosen Freeholders and our municipalities, like Carteret, are committed to keeping our infrastructure strong," said Middlesex County Freeholder Director Ronald G. Rios. "This grant will make needed improvements to Carteret's roadways, ensuring their residents and visitors can travel safely through the Borough."



The national interactive fitness platform, which offers cuttingedge workout bikes for indoor cycling as well as other fitness related instruments, began occupying the space this past October, using it as a warehouse, distribution and fulfillment center.

Mayor Announces \$2.5 million in Grants for Bishop Andrews Chrome Park Improvements

Mayor Reiman and the Carteret Borough Council were joined by New Jersey Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin and Middlesex County Freeholder Director Ron Rios to announce \$2.5 million in grants the Borough has been awarded for major capital improvements to recreational activities at Bishop Andrews Chrome Park.

The New Jersey Green Acres Grant Program has awarded Carteret \$1 million and the County of Middlesex has awarded \$1.5 million toward the project, which will start in the Spring of 2020 after ongoing remediation is completed by USMR, a former smelting company, who operated in Carteret from 1901-1986.

"Carteret's parks are known for being the best in the region," proclaimed Mayor Dan Reiman. "Chrome Park will now become a regional destination for sports and outdoor activities thanks to support from the state and county."


The Borough plans to install a new multi-purpose turf field at the Park, which will be utilized for football, soccer, Little League baseball and fast pitch softball. The state-of-the-art field will be constructed with the highest quality materials and available for recreational leagues, organized youth sports, and passive public recreation. In addition, new basketball courts will be added, which will allow for pickup games and outdoor recreation leagues. Throughout the park, landscaping improvements will


be made, including new plants, trees, soil, and flowers which will improve aesthetics and offer an inviting public space.

"Outdoor activities and recreation are important for all children," said NJ Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin. "The amenities at Carteret's Chrome Park will provide children and adults with state of the art facilities in a safe, welcoming environment."

Just a few years ago, the Borough made \$1.2 million in improvements to the park, including paved pathways, ADA compliant pedestrian areas, concrete sidewalks, benches, picnic tables, drainage improvements, additional parking spaces, and a Spray Park featuring a textured concrete spray pad with an above ground structure that sprays jets in a variety of patterns, and also acts as a water reservoir to use for landscaping.

Donate Blood to Cure Current Shortage

New Jersey is currently facing a blood shortage and donations are critically needed, according to Vitalant, one of the state's primary blood providers. During the busy holiday season, 21,000 fewer blood donations were received than expected, and now blood providers nationwide have less than a two days' supply of necessary blood types.

Shortages in blood supply force hospitals to prioritize blood in some circumstances and vital surgeries may need to be postponed because blood is needed for trauma patients who suffer life-threatening injuries.

"I encourage all eligible donors to consider donating blood as soon as possible," said Mayor Reiman. "Every two seconds a patient needs blood and someday that patient may be you or someone you love." According to the Red Cross, a single donation can save three lives. One blood donation provides different blood components that can help up to three different people. In addition, blood cannot be manufactured, so donations are the only way we can give blood to those who need it.

Nearly 21 million blood components are transfused in the U.S. every year, yet only 37 percent of the country's population is able to donate blood.

All Carteret Residents Encouraged to Paricipate in 2020 Census

Mayor Reiman is encouraging all Carteret residents to participate in the 2020 U.S. Census. Supplying accurate information to the Census Bureau will ensure that Carteret and the State of New Jersey receive part of the \$800 billion in federal funds being provided for infrastructure projects, healthcare, social programs, and assistance.

"It's important for all residents of Carteret to be counted so we can receive our fair share from the Federal government," said Mayor Reiman. "Regardless of your immigration status, please fill out the simple questionnaire by phone, online, or by mail. It only takes a few minutes and it is illegal for any of your answers

to be used against you by any law enforcement agency or court." All households will receive a mailed invitation to participate in the Census over the phone or online. Households that do not respond will receive mailed paper forms by early April. The remaining non-participants will be visited by Census workers by late May.

Social Security Launches New Campaign to Fight Scammers



The Social Security Administration launched a new Public Service Announcement (PSA) campaign to continue warning people about the ongoing nationwide telephone impersonation scheme. The PSAs feature a message from Social Security Commissioner Andrew Saul. Social Security and its Office of the Inspector General (OIG) continue to receive reports about fraudulent phone calls from people falsely claiming to be Social Security employees. The scammers mislead victims into making cash or gift card payments for help with purported identity theft, or to avoid arrest for bogus Social Security number problems.

"I want every American to know that if a suspicious caller states there is a problem with their Social Security number or account, they should hang up and never give the caller money or personal information. People should then go online to oig.ssa.gov to report the scam call to Social Security," said Commissioner Saul.

People should also be on the lookout for a new version of this scam. Fraudsters are now emailing fake documents in attempts to get people to comply with their demands. Victims have received emails with attached letters and reports that appear to be from Social Security or the OIG. The letters may use official letterhead and government jargon to convince victims they are legitimate; they may also contain misspellings and grammar mistakes.

Social Security employees do occasionally contact people--Security employees will never threaten a person, or promise a should never provide information or payment over the phone Social Security benefit approval, or increase, in exchange for information or money. In those cases, the call is fraudulent and

people should just hang up.

Generally, the agency mainly calls people who have recently applied for a Social Security benefit, someone who is already receiving payments and requires an update to their record, or a person who has requested a phone call from the agency. If a person is not in one of these situations, they normally would not receive a call from the agency.

Social Security will not:

- Tell you that your Social Security number has been suspended.
- Contact you to demand an immediate payment.
- Ask you for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- Require a specific means of debt repayment, like a prepaid debit card, a retail gift card, or cash.
- Demand that you pay a Social Security debt without the ability to appeal the amount you owe.
- Promise a Social Security benefit approval, or increase, in exchange for information or money.

If there is a problem with a person's Social Security number or record, in most cases Social Security will mail a letter. If a generally those who have ongoing business with the agency- person needs to submit payments to Social Security, the agency -by telephone for business purposes. 
