

At the Borough Council's Jan. 2 reorganization meeting, Mayor Daniel J. Reiman swore in newly named Council President Dennis MiMascio and recently re-elected council members Susan Naples and Randy Krum.

All three have served on the Borough Council for

many years.

"I would like to thank our residents, our staff, my council colleagues, and our team leader, Mayor Daniel J. Reiman," Councilwoman Naples said. "Thank you, Mayor, for your friendship and your support and your dedication to our community. Your leadership is second to none. Our Borough renaissance is nothing short of amazing. Myself being a generational Carteret person -- my family has been here since the early 1900s – I'm sure they are looking down and are really thrilled that their land has become in such good shape due to your efforts."

The Councilwoman also thanked for his support Middlesex County Commissioner Director and Borough resident Ronald G. Rios, who was in attendance, and the recently expanded police department and its Chief Dennis McFadden, who leads daily by example, she said. She also thanked young grand-daughter Madeline for taking the time to participate in the swearing-in ceremony.

Councilman Krum said he was grateful to have served with the Mayor for the past 21 years.

served with the Mayor for the past 21 years. "We have a great team here," he said. "I also would like to thank my council mates and residents of Carteret for seeing what this great Council does. I look forward to moving Carteret in the right direction."

In accepting his one-year post as Council President, DiMascio said he was looking forward to Carteret

continuing to make progress.

That progress includes a forthcoming ferry, a Riverwalk, and a movie studio on its Arthur Kill waterfront; three new Crow Holdings warehouses that recently opened on the Rahway River on a former Brownfield site; more than \$300 million in the downtown redevelopment of several multi-use properties; many park improvements with county and municipal Open Space and state Green Acres funds, and major investments in municipal infrastructure, such as repaved streets and repaired sewers and storm-water systems.

Mayor Remain is in the second year of a record sixth consecutive four-year term. He is the first person in the history of the Borough to be elected to six consecutive four-year Mayoral terms. Originally elected to the Borough Council in 2000 at the age of 24, the Mayor went onto become the youngest person ever elected mayor in Carteret at 26 in 2002.



New Year's Resolution: Do

12 Tips to Decrease Landfi

Do headlines like, "Climate change will increase wildfire risk and lengthen fire seasons" or "Fate of Artic Sea ice likely sealed, even with climate action" have you frightened and angry enough to take action, but you don't know how?

All you can do is what you can do, and that can include reducing the amount of trash you contribute

to the landfill.

Why?

According to the New York-based Environmental Defense Fund, methane, which is emitted by land-fill waste, is 80 times the warming power of carbon dioxide during the first 20 years after it reaches the atmosphere. Even though CO2 has a longer-lasting effect, methane sets the pace for warming in the near term, which is what is inspiring the aforementioned scary headlines.

The ways in which to keep waste out of the landfill are plentiful. While you may not be able to go as extreme as Zero Waste, which is to reuse and recycle all waste, here are 12 goals that you can achieve this

New Year:

- 1. Recycle at the curbside regularly. Items that will be picked up include newspapers and cardboard, which must be bundled and tied. Other items, which must be placed in blue recycling containers, are shirt boxes, cereal boxes, junk mail, magazines, coupons, metal, tin and aluminum cans, and glass and plastic bottles (#1 and #2 only). Additional blue recycling containers are available for purchase from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekdays at the Carteret Recycling Center at 339 Roosevelt Ave. Call 732-541-3881 for more info. Note that in Carteret, plastic bags even if the company that markets them says they are for recycling cannot be used for recycling. Only the Borough's blue bins can be used.
- 2. You also can call the Recycling Department to pick up bushes, branches, electronics and computers for free. Recycling also will pick up masonry and concrete for a fee based on volume. Call for an estimate. Branches must be bundled and tied.
- 3. All pick-up items also can be dropped off at the Recycling Center. All drop offs are free except for masonry, concrete, branches and bushes. The fees for those are based on volume, but the first cubic yard is free. Call for an estimate. Clothing, soft cover books, and hard cover books with the covers removed also can be dropped off for free at the Recycling Center. Tires also may be dropped off but for a fee. Tires are \$2 per car tire and \$5 per truck tire. Tires, books and clothing cannot be picked up. Call 732-541-3881 for info. Rechargeable batteries and watch batteries also

can be recycled for free but must be dropped off at the Carteret Public Library at 100 Cooke Ave. Call 732-541-3830 for info about that.

- 4. Bags of leaves also can be picked up by or dropped off to the Recycling Center. Leaf bags are available for free at the Recycling Center. Only Borough-provided leaf bags can be used because they are composted with the leaves by the county. Leaves in plastic bags will end up in the landfill if they're picked up at all. But rather than bag the leaves, consider mulching them by simply mowing over them without your lawn mower's bag. The mower will chop the leaves up into fine particles that are a great mulch for your lawn.
- 5. Another thing to do with leaves is compost them yourself in your backyard along with plant-based kitchen scraps, crushed egg shells, coffee grinds and filters, tea leaves and bags (without staples), cut flowers, garden and grass clippings, shredded newspaper, plant stalks, twigs, branches, wood chips, and undyed paper bags and brown paper packaging. Three types of compost bins are available from the county Division of Solid Waste Management for only \$25 to \$50. The composter comes with a small bucket to hold scraps and an instruction manual. Composting will greatly reduce the amount of trash and methane you contribute to the landfill. Everything you need to know about composting can be found at middlesexcountynj.gov/government/departments/ department-of-public-safety-and-health/office-ofhealth-services/solid-waste-management-program/ composting. Advice and suggestions also are available from the Borough Recycling/Clean Communities Coordinator at 732-541-3835.

6. In the kitchen and dining room, use cloth towels and napkins rather than paper ones. This will reduce how much you contribute to the landfill, as well as a significant savings in groceries. Similarly, in public bathrooms, use the hand dryer instead of paper towels. Other reusable items that will reduce landfill waste are shopping bags at all stores, not just the supermarket; refillable water bottles; washable travel mugs, and metal, glass or bamboo straws. And away from home, use real forks, knives and spoons rather than disposable plastic ones and real plates instead of plastic or paper ones.

7. Rather than recycle plastic containers, refill them at Rahway Refillery, a "no waste marketplace." At 1425 Main St. in Rahway, the local refillery offers solutions to eliminate waste of single-use products in the home, which reduces landfill waste. A BYOB Refill Bar offers liquid and powder cleaning products for the home, laundry and bath, including shampoo, conditioner, shower gel, hand soap, body lotion, all-purpose cleaner, bathroom cleaner, laundry concentrate, laundry powder, dish soap, dishwasher gel concentrate, dishwasher powder, and non-alcoholic hand sanitizer. Rahway Refillery's products are non-toxic, plant-based and sustainably sourced, according to founding co-owner Frances Zafra. Guests receive 5 percent off refills when they bring their own bottle. The No Waste Marketplace also offers a variety of other environmentally friendly products. Hours are noon to 7 p.m. Wednesday to Fridays, 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturdays, and noon to 5 p.m. Sundays. For more info, visit RahwayRefillery.com.

8. Plastic bags, liners and packaging are not recyclable at the curb or the Borough Recycling Center, but they can be recycled by a company called Trex, which manufactures wood-alternative composite decking, railing and other outdoor items made from recycled materials. The items they utilize include plastic grocery bags, produce bags, ice bags, Ziploc and other re-closable bags, cereal box liners, case overwrap, bread bags, newspaper sleeves, dry cleaning bags, product wrap, bubble wrap, air pillows, and plastic e-commerce mailers. All plastic must be clean, dry and free of food residue. According to Trex, stores that collect Trex materials include Kohls in Linden, Stop & Shop in Edison, Target in Edison and Linden, and Whole Foods in Metuchen. For more, visit nextrex.com.

9. Takeout containers made from polystyrene, which is a harder plastic than Styrofoam, is illegal for New Jersey restaurants to use. Polystyrene is carcinogenic, according to the World Health Organization's International Agency for Research on Cancer. Ask restaurants to switch to paper takeout containers. If they don't, report them to the state Department of Environmental Protection at 877-927-6337.

10. The county also offers recycling events. The 2024 Middlesex County Household Hazardous Waste schedule will be 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. on March 17 and Nov. 17, Middlesex College, 2600 Woodbridge Ave., Edison, and Sept. 21, Middlesex County Public Works, 750 Jernee Mill Road, Sayreville.

The county regularly recycles paint and cooking oil, which the Borough Recycling Center doesn't accept. For drop-off times and locations, as well as a list of household hazardous waste items, visit middlesexcountynj.gov/government/departments/department-of-public-safety-and-health/office-of-health-services/solid-waste-management-program/recycling-programs-and-events.


If you miss the Borough's paper shred events from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on June 15 and Oct. 12 in Carteret Community Center parking lot, 100 Cooke Ave., the County Paper Shred Schedule includes April 27, Fort Grumpy, 3750 Bordentown Ave., Sayreville; June 2, Papaianni Park, 100 Municipal Boulevard, Edison, and Sept. 22, Woodbridge Department of Public Works, 225 Smith St. For more info, call 732-745-4170. For the Borough Paper Shred events, call Recycling/Clean Communities at 732-541-3835.

11. If your employer doesn't recycle, clean and store recyclables in a garbage bag, and when it fills up, bring the bag home and unbag, sort and recycle the materials accordingly. If you decide to compost, you immediately can bring food waste home from work for the composter. If your workplace is not recycling, report them to its county Solid Waste Division, which will help them get in compliance.

12. Stay abreast of recycling and environmental issues with the Recycle Coach app, available for free to every Carteret resident. Use the QR code in the advertisement on the next page to download the app. If you already have it, utilize it as much as you can. You'll find more recycling opportunities throughout the year, and it will help with your recycling needs and knowledge. Recycling Coach is especially great to turn kids onto recycling and the environment.

Other recycling resources are at middlesex countynj.gov/recycle. You also can learn about recycling April 20 at the third annual Carteret Earth Day Celebration in Carteret Park, where there'll also be a bunch of family fun, including live and DJ music, bouncy houses, food trucks, community art project, park cleanup, and health, wellness & fitness expo.

freshmen were undefeated. Sophomore year is the hardest year, and the kids that stuck around already are putting in time in the weight room. I'm excited for this group moving up because we're going to see a lot better competition.

How many tour dates do you do a year? We usually do around 50 to 60 shows a year.

Who's in the band, what instruments do they play, to which Heartbreaker are they paying tribute, and how did you get together?

Ronnie Gregg, lead vocals, rhythm guitar; Paul Jones, bass; Nick Swan, lead guitar; Tony Mac, drums, and Jeff Hollandsworth, keyboards. We formed the band in 2016 out of mutual love of Tom's music.

Is Paul Jones a fan of John Paul Jones, Led Zeppelin's bassist?

Paul is a fan of John Paul Jones. We all love Led Zeppelin.

What do you admire most about Tom Petty & the Heartbreakers?

Always loved their style. In my opinion, they were always one of the coolest bands.

Why and how is Tom Petty the greatest rock 'n' roll songwriter?

He wrote about life and love unlike any other songwriter I've ever heard. He is one of the few artists that makes the hairs on your arm stand up.

Besides Tom Petty & the Heartbreakers, what is the greatest musical common ground of the members of Southern Accents?

We just have a certain music chemistry between us that works. I'm very blessed to work with such a talented bunch of guys.

How often do you play in New Jersey?

We have only played New Jersey a few times, mainly in the Vineland area. So we're totally excited to be coming to a new area of New Jersey.

After Carteret, when will you be back in Jersey and where?
